Laguna Madre Designated Part of Western Hemisphere Shorebird Network

The WHSRN Council gave final approval to the designation of 4 new Sites into the Network. At it's regular meeting September 17 in Indianapolis, Indiana the Council formally endorsed the nominations of Elkhorn Slough (California), Lake Erie Marshes (Ohio & Michigan), Laguna Madre (Texas & Mexico), and Guerrero Negro (Mexico) bringing the total number of recognized shorebird reserves up to 46. The total area of these sites brings over 120,000 acres (75,000 hectares) into the reserve system and includes 22 partners who are committed to the conservation of these critical wetland habitats.

Elkhorn Slough, located on the California coast at Monterey Bay, confirms the presence of 21 shorebird species (plus 19 uncommon/rare sightings!) totalling 39,000 shorebirds during spring and fall migrations and the site serves as important wintering habitat for many shorebirds. The Lake Erie Marshes, located along the northwestern shoreline of Lake Erie in Ohio and Michigan, hosts 38 species of shorebirds totally at least 48,000 birds. Partners include the Black Swamp Bird Observatory, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (3 refuges), the states of Ohio and of Michigan, and FirstEnergy Company. The Laguna Madre site is the first Bi-National Site with coastal habitat in both Texas, USA and Tamaulipas, Mexico. In Texas the site includes the Laguna Atascosa NWR and The Nature Conservancy South Padre Island Reserve and in Tamaulipas, Mexico the site includes the Rancho Rincon lands along Laguna Madre. Both of these sites are also under consideration as a Ramsar site. The combined site hosts at least 100,000 shorebirds during migration and during the winter. Thirty-seven species have been counted at the site, including the endangered Piping Plover during the winter season. The Laguna Madre is also a major area for waterfowl. especially Redheads, and is the only breeding area for Ocelots in the U.S.A. Partners include the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, The Nature Conservancy, the State of Texas, Texas Center for Policy Studies, the Rancho Rincon, ProNatura, DUMAC, and SEMARNAP. Guerrero Negro, located along the shores of Ojo De Liebre Lagoon in Baja California Sur, Mexico, is the site of a long established salt extraction facility ("salina") run jointly by the Government of Mexico and Mitsubishi Corporation. The site has confirmed the presence of over 124,000 shorebirds during migration and over-wintering with at least 20 species identified. The area has also become famous for the gray whales that use the area. Partners at the site include Exportadora de Sal (ESSA), the town of Guerrero Negro, ProNatura, El Vizcaino Biosphere Reserve, and the Autonomous University of Baja California Sur in La Paz. Governor's Conservation Task Force Recommendations

The Governor's Task Force on Conservation today approved a set of specific recommendations about how Texas can meet our state's conservation and outdoor recreation needs in the 21st century.

Governor Bush created the twelve-member task force by Executive Order on February 24, 2000. He charged its members with studying the issues of conservation, land-fragmentation, public parks, outdoor recreation, and nature tourism, and making recommendations for how best to protect and enhance the state¹s natural resources and increase outdoor recreation opportunities for Texans.

"I commend this task force of conservation leaders for outlining a bold vision for Texas' future," said Governor Bush. "The task force has recommended ways for a dynamic and growing Texas to better protect our natural resources including open spaces, habitat and water - and to provide more accessible outdoor recreational opportunities for generations to come."

The task force makes the following recommendations in three major categories: private lands, public lands, and water.

Recommendations on Private Lands

Ninety-seven percent of the land in Texas is privately owned, so any comprehensive conservation effort in Texas depends on private landowners' participation and cooperation. The task force recommends that the state provide landowners additional incentives and partnership opportunities to better care for and conserve their lands:

- Create a statewide Purchase of Development Rights program to compensate willing landowners for restricting future development of their lands. The Legislature would create the fund and a council to administer the fund.
- Reform federal and state tax laws to encourage conservation by private landowners.
- Expand incentives and assistance to landowners for habitat management, including expanding the use of Wildlife Management Plans, conservation agreements and the Landowner Incentive Program, increasing technical assistance to landowners, and forming more voluntary Wildlife Co-ops to help improve wildlife habitats.
- Encourage outdoor recreation development opportunities on private lands, including nature tourism, by encouraging partnerships between public and private sectors, and examining liability issues that may inhibit private participation in recreation and conservation projects.

Recommendations on Public Lands

The task force found that as Texas continues to grow and the demand for recreation and natural resource conservation continues to grow, the State's current park lands will not be able to meet future needs. The Task Force recommends that the State assess local and state needs and resources and develop a strategic, statewide plan to meet the identified conservation and outdoor recreation demands.

- Develop a comprehensive system to address conservation and to assure easily accessible outdoor recreation, including urban nature centers and outdoor recreation programs.
- Ensure funds to repair, maintain, and develop our existing public lands, and to acquire lands that meet the state's

- strategic conservation and outdoor recreation needs; create a blue-ribbon panel to identify state sites that should be transferred to other entities.
- Strengthen the ability of local governments to address conservation and outdoor needs by increasing grants for local parks and conservation, and giving fast-growing counties more tools to address growth.

Recommendations on Water

The task force found water to be the most critical conservation issue in Texas. The Senate Bill 1 regional water planning groups and several legislative interim committees are also addressing Texas' water needs. Water is the limiting factor for all aquatic life, plants, wildlife, and many types of recreation. The task force found that as the State faces increasing water demands for municipal growth, industry, and agriculture, we also must provide water to meet the needs of our natural resources. Recommendations include:

- For new water use, ensure adequate quantity and quality of water to support healthy land and water ecosystems.
- Incorporate the needs of fish and wildlife into existing water resource management.
- Promote agricultural water uses that also benefit wildlife.
- Protect Texas springs that are an important contributor to many Texas streams and rivers.

The Task Force recommendations serve as a blueprint that legislators can draw from in the 2001 Session and sessions to come. Implementing these recommendations will position Texas as a leader in conservation and enhance the quality of life of our citizens for generations to come.

Audubon Named Partner Designate for North America by Birdlife International

New York, NY November 20, 2000 - The National Audubon Society was named a partner designate of BirdLife International, it was announced by Frank Gill, Audubon's senior vice president for Science. Under the agreement, which was made earlier this fall, Audubon will cooperate with BirdLife International on a variety of bird conservation projects, serving as that organization's provisional partner for the United States. BirdLife International is a global partnership of more than 100 conservation organizations with a focus on birds that works together on shared priorities, polices and programs of conservation action, exchanging skills, achievements, and information.

"We are truly honored to be working with BirdLife International," said Audubon's Gill. "Audubon and BirdLife International approach conservation with the same philosophy, using the same guiding principles. We believe that our conservation goals can only be met through a balanced, science based course of action that helps people and protects the earth's diversity of life. This is a natural partnership."

Audubon already devotes significant resources to BirdLife International's Important Bird Areas (IBA) Program first started by BirdLife International in Europe in the 1980s. A priority of Audubon's bird conservation efforts, the IBA program aims to identify and protect a network of sites critical for the long-term viability of naturally occurring bird populations. Having helped identify and create hundreds of IBAs, Audubon is the organization most closely identified with the program in the United States.

Less than "common", as "JEF-SW 7/5(2) ABC", which means seen in Jefferson County (JEF) at Sabine Woods (SW) on the 5th of July, two (2) birds, reported by observer "ABC".
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Commentary: It has certainly been an interesting fall migration season! The effects of the lengthy drought and an "early" strong cold front which came through October 9 made for interesting birding. This fall has had it all, and the details are recorded below.

Green-tailed Towhee -- 21 Oct 2000

Seen in Sabine Woods during the October Field trip by many of the participants. Large Sparrow. Grayish bird with almost brick-red cap, pale yellowish-green (a little yellower than "parrot green") wings and upper tail. Pale grav undersides, with whiter throat with black whisker.

Bird Alerts

By the first few days of December, our winter residents were present in good numbers. Following the cold front, there were a lot of Red-tailed Hawks and Kestrels along the coast between Sabine Pass and Sea Rim. Golden-crowned Kinglets were present in Sabine Woods, as was a good variety of sparrows, including a flock of Field Sparrows and several Chipping Sparrows.

Don Jeane started the program off with slides of birds taken at several different localities: Rio Grande Valley, Big Bend, Anahuac, Dam B, Alaska, and Southeastern Arizona. A variety of birds were shown: Wood Duck, Pyrrhuloxia, Roadrunner, Black-bellied Whistling-duck, Plain Chachalaca, Morning Dove, Acorn Woodpecker, Green Heron, American Coots, Ruby-crowned Kinglet, Anhinga, Ptarmigan, Mew Gull, immature Great Horned Owl, rail, Bald Eagle, Arctic Tern, Tundra Swan, Gila Woodpecker, female Hummingbird, Gambel's Quail, Yellow Grosbeak, Curvedbilled Thrasher, Canyon Towhee, White-winged Doves. Virginia Rail, Sora Rail, Cinnamon Teal, Broad-billed Hummingbird, Yellow-eyed Junco, Mexican Jay, Blackheaded Grosbeak, and Scott's Oriole. Like Rose Ann last year, Don's slides also included some wonderful sunset pictures. Next, Steve Mayes showed some slides that were taken at Cattail Marsh. The bird slide was of White Ibis. He also included some non-bird slides which included a dragonfly and a White Stripped Long Tail Butterfly (this was a first timer for Cattail Marsh).
